Of the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Princeton
September 11, 2012
Regular Session 7:00 P.M.**

Mayor Moore called the meeting to order at 7:10 P.M. and read the open public meetings statement as follows:

“This meeting is called to order pursuant to the provisions of the Open Public Meetings Law. This meeting of September 11, 2012, was included in a list of meetings sent to and advertised in the Princeton Packet and Trenton Times, posted on the bulletin board in the Borough of Princeton municipal building and has remained continuously posted as the required notices under the statute. In addition a copy of this notice is and has been available to the public and is on file in the Office of the Borough Clerk. Proper notice having been given, the Borough Clerk is directed to include this statement in the minutes of this meeting.”

Mayor Moore asked all present to rise for **Agenda Item C, Salute to the Flag.**

Mayor Moore called for a moment of silence in remembrance of September 11, 2001. After, she read the names of Princetonians lost that day.

Mayor Moore read **Agenda Item D, Public Presentation**, and asked if anyone present wished to address Council with an issue not on the agenda. Mayor Moore explained the five-minute limit for public presentations; no dialogue with Council members is permitted during this portion of the agenda. If so indicated, Council will take action at a later date.

Council President Trelstad reminded that on April 24, 2007, Council named the plaza at the library after Albert Hinds and approved sculptural gates and a plaque for the plaza. She stated that all costs associated with the artwork have been underwritten privately.

Councilman Martindell said that Borough Administrator Robert Bruschi had told him that consolidated personnel goals are being met.

Councilman Martindell reported that Borough Hall vending machines generate no income for the Borough.

Assistant Administrator Sandra L. Webb announced that 11 positions have been eliminated from the combined towns—police had zero reductions (yet lower because of retirements); a few positions slated to be eliminated were repurposed (into vacant slots); title of assistant administrator added.

Ms. Webb explained that vending machine usage is primarily by employees; a lower contract cost is given to the Borough than if the machine was readily available to the public.

Mayor Moore mentioned a new requirement for taxpayers—separating utility payment (i.e., sewer) from property taxes. She mentioned two referenda before voters during the fall 2012: Princeton Public Schools capital improvements (September 24) and open space tax (November 6).

Deputy Clerk Delores Williams announced that TV viewers are calling the police dispatcher desk stating that they cannot hear the speakers.

Mayor Moore reported that the Township has endorsed the joint letter to the media opposing A-2586, which exempts private colleges from local planning and zoning regulations. The Higher Education Committee of the Assembly will hear A-2586 on September 24 at 10 A.M. at the State House.

Seeing no one further, Mayor Moore closed the public portion.

Mayor Moore read **Agenda Item E, Correspondence (1) — Draft Letter — Assembly Bill #2586** — *Councilman Roger Martindell*.

Councilman Martindell explained that A-2586 empowers the schools to “build anything they want”—unlike any other landowner in town. He was concerned about the integrity of health, safety, environment, the local economy and quality of life under A-2586—not in the best interests of the community at large.

Councilwoman Crumiller had reservations because the cause behind A-2586 would be strengthened if the institutions refused to support the letter opposing A-2586—a probable outcome. She was reluctant to put them on the spot, without certain knowledge of their intentions.

Councilman Martindell said it would be a mistake not to issue the invitation to join the greater interests of the entire community.

Councilwoman Crumiller repeated that possible negatives outweigh the benefits.

Councilman Wilkes made the distinction between self-interested enlightenment, institutional enlightenment, and public (democratic) enlightenment. He thought Councilman Martindell’s

letter would offer an opportunity for internal and public thought about the schools' fitting into a dialogue taking place in a democracy, which is much of what planning and zoning are about. He hoped higher learning institutions would side with what is right for the town.

Councilwoman Butler thought passage of A-2586 would be overwhelmingly negative. If any one of the schools were to agree with the Borough and Township, opposition would be forwarded.

Councilman Wilkes pointed out that the World Trade Centers were built in contravention to New York City ordinances through the power of New York State's Development Authority.

Council President Trelstad moved to accept the letter. Councilwoman Butler seconded. Council approved four to one for Princeton University and five to one for The Institute for Advanced Study, Rider University, and Princeton Theological Seminary; with Councilwoman Crumiller opposed and Councilwoman Howard abstaining with regards to Princeton University.

Mayor Moore read **Agenda Item F, Discussion (1) — Creation of Town Logo.**

Mayor Moore invited everyone to compete in the graphic design challenge for an original logo representing the new town. She mentioned some well-known Princeton images such as the Mercer Oak (Township) and the battle monument (Borough). Mayor Moore stated that members of the Princeton Arts Council will administer the competition. A jury (members not yet identified) will judge the contest entries. Implementation of the logo for all formats will not exceed \$2,500, which is to include the prize of \$500 for the winning design.

Councilman Martindell said the first step must be to determine the new town's official name.

Councilman Wilkes clarified that the competition entries will be submitted blind—that is, the jury will not know the identity of the contestants.

Mayor Moore read **Agenda Item G, Report (1) — Mayor's Wellness Campaign -David Henry, Health Officer.**

Mr. Henry stated that the Mayor's Wellness Campaign began on April 24, 2012 (Borough), and June 25, 2012 (Township). Councilwoman Howard and Mayor Moore had approached Mr. Henry about participation. Twice a week nightly walks from the Y to Faculty Road have been established as "Olivia's Wellness Connection". An upcoming marathon will be sponsored by HiTops. Children's Home Society of New Jersey is a participant, as is their hepatitis support group. Mr. Henry said the Mayor's Wellness Campaign is reaching out to ABC News, in conjunction with Princeton Hospital, regarding a bone marrow donation program as part of the campaign.

Council President Trelstad asked about the goals of the Mayor's Wellness Campaign. Mr. Henry said the ultimate objective is a healthier Princeton through certain activities for youth, adults, and seniors.

Council President Trelstad read and moved **Agenda Item H, Old Business (1) — Resolution 2012-R237** as follows:

**RESOLUTION 2012-R237
OF THE BOROUGH OF PRINCETON
COUNTY OF MERCER, STATE OF NEW JERSEY
A RESOLUTION OF THE BOROUGH OF PRINCETON
APPROVING A RIGHTS-OF-WAY USE AGREEMENT
BETWEEN THE BOROUGH OF PRINCETON AND CROWN CASTLE NG EAST INC.
FOR THE INSTALLATION OF A TELECOMMUNICATIONS SYSTEM**

WHEREAS, the Borough of Princeton (the “Borough”) desires to enter into a rights-of-way use agreement (“Use Agreement”) with Crown Castle NG East Inc.

WHEREAS, Crown Castle NG East Inc. was approved by the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities (“BPU”) to provide local exchange and interexchange telecommunications services throughout the State of New Jersey and intends to provide telecommunication services in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Federal Communications Commission and the BPU; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to such authority granted by BPU, Crown Castle NG East Inc. may locate, place, attach, install, operate and maintain facilities within Public Rights-of-Way for purposes of providing telecommunications services; and

WHEREAS, Crown Castle NG East Inc. proposes to place its telecommunication facilities aerially on existing utility poles or in underground conduit in the Public Rights-of-Way within the Borough for the purpose of owning, constructing, installing, operating, repairing and maintaining a telecommunications system; and,

WHEREAS, it is in the public interest for the Borough to promote competition in the telecommunications market and for the Borough to grant consent to Crown Castle NG East Inc. to occupy said Public Rights-of-Way within the Borough for this purpose; and,

WHEREAS, the consent granted herein is for the non-exclusive use of the Public Rights-of-Way within the Borough for the purpose of owning, constructing, installing, operating, and maintaining a telecommunications system.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Borough Council of the Borough of Princeton, as follows:

1. Crown Castle NG East Inc. is hereby granted permission to install, operate and maintain its telecommunications system within the Borough of Princeton in accordance with the routing plan previously provided to the Borough for approval. If there should be any deviation from either the routing plan or method of installation as presently proposed, Crown Castle NG East Inc. will notify the Borough Engineer and post a performance bond for the work, if said bond is determined by the Borough to be required.

2. The Borough, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 48:3-18 has the authority to enter into the Use Agreement, which attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein in its entirety, with Crown Castle NG East Inc. for the use of utility poles upon such terms and conditions as agreed upon by the Borough and Crown Castle NG East Inc.

3. The installation, operation and maintenance of Crown Castle NG East Inc. telecommunications system shall not interfere with the safety or convenience of persons or vehicles traveling on public streets, highways or right-of-way within the Borough.

4. In accordance with the terms of the Use Agreement, Crown Castle NG East Inc. shall agree to indemnify, save, defend and hold harmless the Borough, and its officers, officials, agents, servants, administrators, and employees, from and against any and all liability or damages arising out of the use of said premises or property. Crown Castle NG East Inc. will post a \$10,000 bond which shall stay in effect as long as its equipment remains installed within the Borough of Princeton, if said bond is determined by the Borough to be required.

5. A notice of this action shall be published in The Times of Trenton and The Princeton Packet as required by law within ten (10) days of its passage.

6. An executed copy of the contract between the Borough and Crown Castle NG East Inc. and a copy of this Resolution shall be on file and available for public inspection in the Office of the Borough Clerk.

Mayor Moore noted that Resolution 2012-R237 was returned to Council for review of the performance bond provisions and coverage of Borough legal fees.

September 11, 2012

Mayor Moore opened the public discussion and asked if anyone wished to address Council on this issue.

Peter Broy, of Crown Castle, clarified that the resolution specifies the bond to be \$10,000. Crown Castle agrees to that term.

Councilwoman Crumiller seconded. Council accepted unanimously.

Council President Trelstad read by title and moved to table **Agenda Item I, New Business (1) — Introduction and Authorization to Publish Ordinance 2012-15, AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE LEASE OF NASSAU STREET KIOSKS TO THE PRINCETON REGIONAL CHAMBER OF COMMERCE PURSUANT TO N.J.S.A 40A:12-14 AND 15.**

Councilwoman Butler seconded. Council agreed unanimously to table.

Mr. Bruschi summarized talks with the Chamber of Commerce about improvements to the downtown kiosks, which sometimes are eyesores and sources of litter.

Peter Crowley, Chamber of Commerce President, introduced his team members present in the audience. The aim for the kiosks is to help present the assets of Princeton to residents and visitors alike with a cleaner, better organized, and more visible opportunity to learn. He described current postings on kiosk panels and proposed improved designs for municipal and nonprofit information flyers plus advertisements. Mr. Crowley hoped to offer enhancements such as weatherproof panels and on-off timed backlighting.

Lori Rabon, General Manager of the Nassau Inn, announced that the interactive display will be mirrored in the visitor center at the U- Store.

Merchants are working on a map to catalogue every downtown business.

Councilman Martindell mentioned his concern with the content: social, political, and religious messages that are now posted on kiosks as a public forum—even extreme messages, which make some people uncomfortable. His concern is if the kiosks are turned over to a private unit the material will become more commercial, perhaps sacrificing the public forum aspect.

Councilman Martindell wanted to distinguish between the right-to-post on public displays like a kiosk and posting material on bulletin boards in private retail establishments. Kiosks provide a public forum for public dialogue, where private/retail bulletin boards are commercial space and material can be legally taken down at anytime.

Councilwoman Butler commented that design standards (including streetscape vision and issues of litter and storefront upkeep) were needed for Nassau and Witherspoon Streets. Councilwoman Butler thought kiosk promotions were a vestige of a past way to communicate. She was concerned about safety at busy intersections.

Council President Trelstad thought the new kiosk program was a good beginning toward improved communication between government and residents.

Council President Trelstad read and moved **Agenda Item I, New Business (2) — Resolution 2012-R245** as follows:

Councilman Martindell seconded. Council accepted unanimously.

Council President Trelstad read **Agenda Item I, New Business (3) — Resolution 2012-R246** as follows:

**RESOLUTION 2012-R246
OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL
OF THE BOROUGH OF PRINCETON
APPROVING PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENTS FOR
KSS ARCHITECTS FOR CONSOLIDATION ARCHITECTS PHASE II-TASK 2
AND
YEDLIN COMPANY FOR CONSOLIDATION CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT SERVICES**

WHEREAS, the Borough of Princeton and the Township of Princeton shall consolidate as a new municipal corporation as of January 1, 2013 pursuant to *N.J.S.A. 40A:65-25 et seq.*; and

WHEREAS, in order to accommodate the consolidation of the municipal staffs of the Borough of Princeton and the Township of Princeton, renovations will be required to the Monument Building (Borough Hall) and the Witherspoon Building (Township Hall); and

WHEREAS, proposals have been solicited from architects and construction managers to facilitate renovations and building improvements necessitated by the consolidation of the two (2) communities; and

WHEREAS, the Borough of Princeton wishes to concur in the award by the Township of Princeton two (2) Professional Services Agreements as outlined hereinabove in order to facilitate the consolidation of the two (2) communities.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Princeton Borough Council as follows:

1. The Princeton Borough Council concurs in the awarding as consolidation expenses Professional Services Agreements as follows:

A. KSS Architects for a sum not-to-exceed one hundred seven thousand two hundred ninety (\$107,290.00) dollars.

B. The Yedlin Company for construction management services for a sum not-to-exceed one hundred twenty-nine thousand five hundred four (\$129,504.00) dollars.

2. A certified true copy of this Resolution shall be furnished to the Township of Princeton upon its adoption.

Councilman Wilkes moved Resolution 2012-R246 and Councilwoman Butler seconded.

Mr. Bruschi stated that both contracts are important for pursuing the consolidation project and cost savings. These contractors will facilitate smooth and speedy moves.

Councilman Martindell observed that the Borough is hiring architects, as well as, a construction manager, while a portion of the architectural contract covers construction administration—an apparent overlap of \$25,000.

Bob Kiser, Princeton Township Engineer, explained that some tasks—new furniture, for example—will be handled in-house, while the construction manager will be responsible for reconfiguring the two buildings. There will be time and money savings from using the manager’s connections and expertise and not having to bid work such as electrical, painting, masonry, and so forth. The architects will ascertain that work is proceeding according to plan, whereas the construction manager assures that work flows smoothly in sequence while maintaining ongoing government functions.

Councilman Wilkes expanded on the two tasks: the architect determines where things go and how they should be arranged; a construction manager contends with schedule, pricing, safety, and converting the architect’s intent into the final product. The two professionals work together on troubleshooting, alternative solutions, and unexpected obstacles.

Council President Trelstad fully supported Resolution 2012-R246.

Mayor Moore called for a voice vote. Council accepted unanimously.

Council President Trelstad read and moved **Agenda Item I, New Business (4) — Resolution 2012-R247** as follows:

REJECTING CONTRACT
FOR CAPITAL PROJECT #11-18**

WHEREAS, the Borough of Princeton has determined the need for construction services in connection with Capital project # 11-18; known as Improvements to Elm Road sidewalks; and

WHEREAS, the Borough has solicited bid proposals for same; and

WHEREAS, all bid proposals were publically opened on August 22, 2012; and

WHEREAS, the Borough received the following bid:
Green Construction in the amount of \$138,424.00; and

WHEREAS, the Borough Engineer and the Borough Attorney have reviewed the bid and determined that the bid submitted by Green Construction, 26 Elizabeth Street, South River, NJ 08882 exceeds the Engineer’s Estimate for this project; and

WHEREAS, the Borough Council desires to approve the rejection of all bids pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:11-13.2 and authorize a re-bid of the Improvements to Elm Road sidewalks.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Princeton that the Borough hereby rejects all bids for the Improvements to Elm Road sidewalks for the reasons cited above.

Council President Trelstad stated that the bid was \$30,000 in excess of Borough Engineer John West's estimate. He recommended re-bidding the project.

Councilwoman Crumiller seconded. Council accepted unanimously.

Council President Trelstad read and moved **Agenda Item I, New Business (5) — Resolution 2012-R248** as follows:

**RESOLUTION 2012-R248
OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL
OF THE BOROUGH OF PRINCETON APPROVING
PAUL ROBESON HOUSE EASEMENT AGREEMENT**

WHEREAS, the Borough of Princeton ("Grantor") is the owner of the real property located in the Borough of Princeton, Mercer County, New Jersey, designated as Green Street on the current Borough of Princeton Tax and Assessment Map (the "Green Street ROW"); and

WHEREAS, the Witherspoon Street Presbyterian Church ("Grantee") is the owner of the real property located in the Borough of Princeton, Mercer County, New Jersey, designated as Lot 55, Block 17.02 on the current Borough of Princeton Tax and Assessment Map (the "Paul Robeson House Property"); and

WHEREAS, the Paul Robeson House Property is located adjacent to the Green Street ROW; and

WHEREAS, on August 19, 1836, William and Sarah Cruser conveyed the Green Street ROW to the Grantor for street purposes, as evidenced by the indenture for property recorded in Mercer County Deed Book A, Page 561; and

WHEREAS, sometime between 1836 and 1879, a residence ("Paul Robeson House") was constructed on the Paul Robeson House Property; and

WHEREAS, sometime prior to 1879, Grantee purchased the Paul Robeson House Property and used the Paul Robeson House as the manse for its pastor; and

WHEREAS, in 1879, the Reverend Drew Robeson was appointed as the pastor of the Grantee and lived with his family in the Paul Robeson House; and

WHEREAS, the Reverend Drew Robeson's son, Paul Robeson, was born in the Paul Robeson House on April 9, 1898; and

WHEREAS, the Paul Robeson House Property was subsequently conveyed to private parties; and

WHEREAS, in 2005, Grantee repurchased the Paul Robeson House Property for use as a memorial to Paul Robeson, with special emphasis on his commitment to equal rights, social activism and the plight of the underserved; and

WHEREAS, in reviewing the title and survey for the Paul Robeson House Property, Grantee discovered that an approximately three (3)-foot-wide portion of the Paul Robeson House and related site improvements associated with the Paul Robeson House Property ("Improvements") encroach upon a portion ("Easement Area") of the Green Street ROW, as more particularly depicted in Exhibit A, attached to the proposed Easement Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Improvements do not encroach upon any paved road bed or curb portions of the Green Street ROW; and

WHEREAS, Grantee seeks an easement from Grantor for Grantee's exclusive use of the Easement Area in conjunction with Grantee's use of the Paul Robeson House Property; and

WHEREAS, Grantor has agreed to grant this easement to Grantee;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Princeton as follows:

1. The Mayor and Clerk of the Borough of Princeton are hereby authorized and directed to enter into an Easement Agreement with the Witherspoon Street Presbyterian Church, creating an easement in a three (3)-foot-wide portion of the Paul Robeson House and related site improvements associated with the Paul Robeson House Property. The Easement Agreement referenced in this Resolution is on file in the Office of the Borough Clerk and may be inspected during regular office hours.

2. A certified true copy of this Resolution shall be furnished upon its adoption to the Witherspoon Street Presbyterian Church, as well as to the Borough of Princeton, One Monument Drive, Princeton, New Jersey 08540, Attention: Jack West, P.E., Borough Engineer.

Councilman Martindell seconded.

Councilman Wilkes recused himself at 9:15 P.M.

Council President Trelstad observed that, when the house was built, it was essentially in the designated roadway width; a fact historically overlooked.

Ben Colberg, an associate of Witherspoon Church and chair of the committee charged with the development of the Robeson House, stated that the church discovered the easement while researching bringing the house to code (no change to footprint).

Councilman Martindell wanted Council to waive legal fees normally charged to the applicant.

Council accepted five to zero.

Councilman Wilkes returned to the dais.

Council President Trelstad read and moved **Agenda Item I, New Business (6 and 7) — Resolution 2012-R249 and Resolution 2012-R250** as follows:

WHEREAS, The Princeton University Art Museum is planning an art museum exhibition “*City of Gold: Tomb and Temple in Ancient Cyprus*”; and

WHEREAS, The Princeton University Art Museum has requested permission to install eight pole banners on Nassau Street with the approval of the Office of Community and State Affairs at Princeton University beginning Saturday, October 6, 2012 through Sunday, January 13, 2013 to advertise the Art Exhibition; and

WHEREAS, the pole banners will be promptly removed after use as required by Borough ordinances; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Borough Ordinance 3-17 any banner that is removed by the Borough will be held by the Borough for thirty (30) days and then disposed of; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Borough Ordinance 3-17 any applicant failing to remove a banner will not be permitted to display any banner for the succeeding two years; and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Mayor and Council hereby approve placement of said pole banners on Nassau Street in accordance with Borough Ordinances 3-14-3-17.

WHEREAS, this banner will be promptly removed after its use as required by Borough ordinances; and
